“Bottled water is a nonsense” by Sonia Sodha (Source: *The Guardian*)

The airport, a much known and sometimes troublesome place, seems to prioritize row after row of fancy shops over providing enough seats at the gate. The thing that surprises me is how hard they make it to get your hands on free drinking water once you have dutifully left yours out before security. More than half of UK airports do not provide drinking fountains, forcing travellers to choose between begging shopkeepers to fill up their bottle or buying the over-priced water. So, how can we bring this situation under control? Is there any way that might be advantageous on our part? Can there be any feasible alternative?

First of all, it is not just about the financial factor, though having to give away almost 3£ for a 500ml bottle in one airport certainly left a bitter taste in me. It is also about the disastrous impact of plastic bottles on the environment. Moreover, we are losing the ground at the cost to our marine life. It is choking our oceans as well as contaminating the food chain. It is estimated that the total weight of plastic in our oceans will exceed that of fish by 2050. The recent mishaps in some coastal countries evidently project that the aqua life is disturbed and we are merely mourning over the tolls. Rather than looking for a cure, we must find out a way to prevent the situation. You would be surprised to know that The International Ocean and Water Life Research Foundation has marked sea waste to be the most influential reason for the disturbances in the ocean whereas hunting comes at number four. Most of these waste materials are objects thrown away by us into the sea. 67% of these materials are plastic products, e.g. bottles, containers, lids, and wrappers.

Considering this dire state, tap water or traditional water fountains, like the ones used in ancient times, could be a viable substitute. We can at least get water from the tap for free, since we spend 2,400,000,000£ a year in the UK buying daily necessities. Moreover, researchers have found that tap water is actually safer to drink than the commercial water bottles. These bottles are not safe in most cases, as reports have shown that many of the companies have hygiene issues while packaging and storing water for a long time in plastic bottles can give birth to harmful chemicals.
